


research


I. Swimming Pool for Josef von Sternberg in 1935





Three seating form that seats different number of people scattered around the space.


design location


Compare to the garden seating area this space is more quiet and is really where the museum can set the tone of the visitor.

















VS. (design taxonomy)

A sunken void that blends with the landscape while offering a range of ergonomic options for users of all ages. The geometry includes gradient surfaces, and curved recesses that support various postures and easy in and out of the void. One side of the formation is intentionally left open, inviting freedom of movement, non-traditional sitting styles, and shifting gaze orientations across the surrounding environment.


Beneath the seating is a network of steam pipes. During winter, these pipes emit warmth through the concrete and the seating, creating a subtle but comforting heat that transforms the void into a welcoming refuge in cold weather.
